## Ian Boyd's commitment to nurturing young people and improving their lives has been an inspiring journey spanning 25 years.

From his early days as a child care worker to his current role as Estates Maintenance Manager, lan's dedication and resilience have made a lasting impact in the Pebbles family. In October 1999, lan joined Radical Services as a child care worker. His first assignment was memorable – he was given the keys to a van and tasked with taking a young person camping. It was a simpler time, before the company expanded its residential facilities. Right from the beginning, lan demonstrated his passion for helping young people, which quickly propelled him forward.

By 2000, after showcasing his commitment, lan was promoted to senior care worker. Just a year later, he took on a new role as manager of a home in Carlisle, all while working toward his NVQ Level 4 in Children and Young People and Level 4 in Leadership and Management. Ian's progression was marked by a dedication to growth, learning,

and providing stability and care for the young people in his charge.

lan's role often called for courage and quick thinking. On one occasion, when a young person encountered a serious situation, the police advised him to take them into hiding. Without hesitation, lan found a safe place on the coast, where they could spend peaceful, undisturbed time. Stories like these highlight his unwavering commitment to the welfare of children and young people.

During his time as a home manager, lan managed several homes across Cumbria before settling at Tyne Close in Penrith. For 18 years, he created a stable and caring environment, impacting over 40 young lives. His dedication did not go unnoticed, with Ofsted recognising the exceptional care in his home, with them consistently being awarded 'Good' grades.

In 2020, Ian expanded his role to focus on the maintenance and health and safety of the Cumbrian homes. His diligence in this field led to his promotion to Estates Maintenance Manager. Over the past four years, lan has been instrumental in raising standards across Pebbles' facilities, including recent improvements at Rowan House, Cherry Blossom House, and Pine House. Today, he oversees four maintenance technicians, ensuring Pebbles' high standards are maintained across the business.

Grant Thomson, our Finance Director, has volunteered to be our team captain as we get together to take on the course.



## Encouraging learning in the local community



As an Adapt Learning Practitioner, Denise Law shows passion, dedication and has nurtured a profound connection with the young people she supports.

Denise's journey into residential child care began after the loss of a close family member who had always dreamed of working with young people. This tragedy motivated Denise to see their dream through, starting to carve out her own path in the sector.

Denise began her career at Pebbles in 2017, initially as a Residential Child Care Worker, before joining the Education team in 2020. The role of Adapt Learning Practitioner is the equivalent of a Pupil Support Assistant within mainstream schools.

"I'm not a teacher," Denise says candidly, "but I understand the role they play. I'm here to get to know the kids and build relationships." This straightforward approach allows Denise to connect deeply with the young people she supports. She relates to them honestly, with a real sense of commitment to their growth and development.

Joining at the height of the COVID-19 pandemic meant that Denise had to quickly adapt to new ways of learning. Supported by the Head Teacher, she worked to reshape how they could engage kids in education who were struggling, including introducing innovative outdoor learning approaches in the local community.

Denise uses her skills to go out and meet young people who aren't engaging in education. For her, the most important first step is fostering a strong relationship – figuring out the young person's likes and dislikes – she takes this information and formulates a plan from there.

For Denise, learning is not confined to a classroom.

Building strong relationships with community initiatives like Kingdom Bikes, Denise secures education for young people where they get to learn the mechanics of and ride motorbikes. Through this method, students not only gain hands-on experience but also work towards gaining youth achievement awards.


Researching local opportunities is a critical part of Denise's role. Whether it's outdoor activities like orienteering, rock climbing, and survival skills at Lochore Meadows, or volunteering at local spots like Rosyth Garden Centre and the Hive LGBT+ Centre in Kirkcaldy, Denise ensures that young people gain valuable life skills and work experience.

Denise acknowledges that not everyone is suited to sitting in a classroom and focuses her work on finding alternatives to traditional education, allowing pupils to achieve awards and recognition that reflect their hard work outside of standard academic frameworks.

Denise also plays a crucial role in helping students transition from education to their next steps, whether it's college, work, or university. Her relationship with a former student who is now in college is a testament to her enduring commitment. Denise works closely with the college tutor to offer additional support wherever needed. For Denise, the job doesn't stop when a pupil leaves school.

When she's not working, Denise takes time for herself, going for runs and travelling in her camper van, Betty, to maintain her own mental health. She recognises that her role can be challenging and prioritises looking after herself too.

Denise's story is one of dedication, resilience, and an unwavering commitment to giving young people the experiences and opportunities they deserve. Through her work, she's not just shaping the lives of those in her care – she's paving the way for brighter futures and happier communities.

T at **Lettershaws** received a glowing report card from school for the autumn term. The whole team is so proud of his progress in education.



## **Education Updates**

Pebbles schools keep thinking outside of the box to provide educational opportunities for our pupils. Here are some of the activities recently organised to engage our young people in real life learning experiences.

In October, the schools organised a fun trip to Murrayfield Stadium, including a tour. Our pupils experienced being part of a squad before a match. One student said that they loved being the captain of the Scotland team as they ran out on to the pitch together, showing true team spirit and leadership skills.

This term, our pupil T went to the Ewe Project at Hillview Animal Farm in Fife. They saw lots of different animals, including alpacas, goats, and rescue donkeys. T's favourite was the little black donkey - the cutest of all! T enjoyed the experience so much that they are going back there once a week to volunteer and put their passion for animals into practice.

To enhance their skills and expand their interests, our pupils have been given the opportunity to choose different activities in electives this term, including boxing, film club, baking, and school of rock. In school of rock, our students put together a song, with some singing different parts and others playing instruments such as guitar and drums. When it was finished, they played it to an audience - a nerveracking experience for many of the young people who had never done something experience in the end and it was worth stepping out of their comfort zone.

There was also a bake sale at Dunfermline school to raise money for MacMillan Cancer Support. To support the event, the young people made advertising posters, selected everything they wanted to sell and then made the bakes during their cooking session. They raised a fantastic total of






Our schools also organised some other exciting educational trips recently to Top Golf and Laser Station in Glasgow, Dynamic Earth in Edinburgh, and the Scottish Assault Course at the SAC in Galston.

At the Scottish Assault Course, the pupils had a fun-filled day out completing three different activities (Nerf Wars, Gel Wars, and Bushcraft). Gel Wars was an exciting and innovative activity where the pupils used state-of-theart gel blasters and worked in teams (staff vs pupils) to get opponents. Armed with advanced gel blasters, the pupils experienced the excitement of shooting biodegradable gel balls at their peers and staff. Nerf Wars was a fast-paced team building game, using foam darts to fire at each other. Both pupils and staff had a lot of fun and laughs playing in the purpose-built indoor nerf game zones that had lots of places to hide. Bushcraft was a skilledbased activity where the pupils were given the scenario of a helicopter crash and had to use the natural materials around them to survive and patch the helicopter, so it was waterproof to sleep in! The pupils also learned how to create a fire to keep warm using twigs from around the forest and special fire lighter blocks to get the fire burning.

As part of the physical and outdoor education programme, our pupils have been taking part in lots of sessions out and about with external providers:

- Dean Castle Country Park Either side of the October break students attended Dean Castle Country Park on Wednesday afternoons for Outdoor Education. They honed their park ranger skills by participating in some orienteering, pond dipping, den building, and fire starting.
- Skiing This term the students have been participating in a skiing program at the dry ski slope in Newmilns. They have been learning a variety of skills with the aim of getting onto the big slope by the end of the program. This has included making a snowplough to slow themselves down, turning/weaving in between cones, and making small jumps down the slope.
- Gym sessions The schools have recently built a partnership with a local gym, InDaHutFitness in Auchinleck, which allows the pupils to attend rigorous PT sessions once a week as a group under the strictest fitness instruction from the gym owner! Our young people can also use the gym individually via the membership scheme the school has set up, which is a great opportunity to enhance physical activity.



#### Our pupils' achievements:

- In English lessons, our pupils have made lots of progress with qualifications. One pupil has completed their first draft of the N5 portfolio (personal essay style), another pupil has completed two of four assessments as part of their N3 Literacy unit, one pupil has completed three of four assessments as part of their N3 Literacy unit and another pupil has completed their first N3 unit, progressing from completing their N2 last academic year.
- In Humanities lessons, there has also been fantastic SQA progress. One pupil has completed their first N4 People and Society unit (Comparing and Contrasting) and another pupil has completed two of four of their N4 People and Society units (Comparing and Contrasting & Making Decisions).
- One pupil is continuing to independently complete their SCQF Level 4 Work Experience Award at a local primary school. They are also working towards their SCQF Level 4 Horse Care through a nearby riding school (this is the next step after passing their RDA award courses).
- Another pupil has started their SCQF Level 4
  Work Experience Award at a local hair salon
  as well as their Introduction to Hairdressing
  award.

We have seen a lot of great work completed in all subjects since August and are looking forward to witnessing and supporting our pupils' achievements during this academic year.

#### New space for learning

At Muirkirk school, the Learning & Development Team has recently vacated the training room and front office at the Sports Hall to relocate to a new facility. Whilst their presence at the campus will be very much missed by the school team and pupils, the education team is excited to transform the vacant rooms into new learning spaces for their students and further develop the curriculum.

#### **Our Education Team's achievements::**

- This term one of our teachers, Kris Finlay, started a college course, studying an outdoor learning leadership award that incorporates the Forest School Practitioner Award. This qualification will enable him to independently lead Forest School and Outdoor Learning sessions. This will add another element to our young people's learning opportunities, through a holistic and learner-led program that allows students to develop themselves through healthy engagement with risk, problem-solving and self-discovery, all within a natural environment in a hands-on and thoughtful manner.
- Our Deputy Head Teacher, Darren Gavin, has successfully completed the National Autism Trainer Programme (NATP) and has therefore qualified as a trainer. Darren worked hard for four weeks to cover the comprehensive course material. Darren also attended the recent Formulation Unveiled webinar ran by our Head of Psychology in November to enhance his understanding of trauma-informed support to young people.

Well done to both members of staff, we are very proud of you and your achievements!

Unlike some homes who can be quick to move young people on when they begin to display challenging behaviour, Forth Craig have wanted M to remain with them so that she knows she has a team around her who truly care no matter what she is going through."

Our **Stoneraise** team received the following feedback from a social worker:

"The home has been great, the changes in S are outstanding. He has a great relationship with the staff and in particular Kylie, she is amazing. Kylie has so much warmth and I can see that in S' response. S can now tell his mum he loves her, he couldn't do that before. He can do this now because he is experiencing living with affection and positive relationships. It's a very therapeutic home and they use PACE really well.

S is now like a different child. The full days in school are phenomenal, he had not been to school for 2 years before. The planning around S going to school was done so well. I was happy to write to the courts about how well this was managed. It was done in a relaxed way - S visited the school before half term, a second visit was longer, and the preparation helped him start full time, it was really good and well thought out."

# Two Wheels, 400 Miles, and Endless Grit – Dr Faye's Arizona Adventure

This year, our Head of Psychology, Dr Faye McLean packed her bike and her courage to join the Komoot Women's Arizona Rally 2024, a self-supported gravel cycling adventure through the deserts of Southern Arizona.

The rally spans 400 miles over eight days, with participants climbing a gruelling 7,500 metres 70 women while carrying everything they need – food, water and camping gear. The days were long and challenging, with temperatures soaring into the 30s and dropping to near freezing at night. At times, Faye had to cycle up to 50 miles between water stops, relying on the 4 litres she carried, though she admits she could have used an extra litre on many occasions.

This wasn't just a physical challenge but a personal milestone for Faye. "It's been 30 years since I last travelled to Arizona and almost just as long since I travelled alone," she shared. "I saw someone mention the rally in a gravel cycling group and thought, why not? I'll apply. I never thought I'd get a place!"

To her surprise, she was accepted, joining about 70 women from across the globe – including the US, UK, Europe, and even New Zealand – for this incredible adventure. The camaraderie was fluid, with groups forming and dissolving naturally along the route. While she enjoyed riding with others, Faye also relished the solitude, occasionally choosing to ride alone and set her own page

"Not a lot of visibility exists for women in endurance cycling events like this," Faye noted. "Confidence with mechanical issues could be a barrier for many women. I was nervous about building my bike myself for the first time as it's something my partner usually handles, but I managed!"



Arizona's breathtaking landscapes provided a stunning backdrop, complete with desert cacti, roadrunners darting across the trail, and the haunting howls of coyotes at night. Despite the rugged environment, Faye thankfully avoided encounters with any of the more dangerous wildlife such as bears or rattlesnakes.

Looking ahead, Faye isn't done with her adventures. She's already eyeing Costa Rica as a potential destination for next year. "There are always other places to see and challenges to take on," she said with a smile.

As Faye continues to inspire with her bold pursuits, we're reminded of the power of stepping outside our comfort zones and embracing the unknown.


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
