Colin's Story

- Pride, Parenthood and the Power of Being True to Yourself



Colin has been with Pebbles for four years, working in our most northern home, Stormont. During his time at Pebbles, Colin has not only supported the young people at Stormont, but also countless others in our local homes. Colin doesn't limit his care for children and young people to his work life; he is also a devoted father of four. He has two sons and a daughter who have grown up and started their own families, and a younger son, Daniel, who is eight and lives at home with him and his husband, Craig.

Colin didn't come out as gay until he was in his 20s:

"It was a different time back then. Being gay wasn't accepted the way it is now. Coming out later in life is strange; they say your 30s become your 20s because you never really got to experience that time in your life as who you truly are."

Colin is deeply thankful for all the support he received, and for the communities who lifted him up. Most of all, he is grateful that his children accept him and that his previous marriage brought him his three wonderful children. Colin and his husband, Craig, recently celebrated 22 years together. On New Year's Day 2014, they tied the knot on the first official day that same–sex couples were granted the same marriage rights as straight couples in Scotland.

Eight years ago, Colin and Craig decided to expand their family when Craig expressed his desire to raise a child. Colin had always felt he would have a fourth child. And so, their journey to find their baby began.

The adoption process was long. But little did they know, the same time they started looking for a baby was the same moment Daniel was born. They spent months searching for a child that would suit their family. Then, on Colin's birthday, a young boy named Daniel appeared in the records. Every year, on his birthday, Colin remembers his friend Daniel, who passed away from cancer, turning his birthday into a bittersweet memorial. So, when they read this new profile, which became live on his birthday, despite there being no photo, they just knew he was the one.

It felt like fate.

They expressed strong interest and met with a family finder to initiate the match. There were many meetings with various professionals, going backwards and forwards, but things were set in motion. Daniel had been living with an older foster couple in their 70s, who adored him and provided wonderful care. In the lead-up to adoption, Colin and Craig would FaceTime Daniel every night before bed and visit whenever possible. The process was emotional and full of delays. But finally, Daniel came home, and their house has been full of love ever since. They still keep in regular contact with Daniel's foster family, who love visiting him, and Colin and Craig make sure to keep them updated on how he's doing.

This life-changing experience inspired Colin to make a difference in more children's lives. He studied Caring for Children with Additional Needs through the Open University. Colin considered fostering but worried it might unsettle Daniel. Concerned that seeing other children come and go might lead him to wonder when it would be his turn.

In 2021, after extensive learning and reflection, Colin discovered Pebbles Care. He knew this role would allow him to truly make a difference. At Stormont, he's seen many changes, welcomed big personalities, and forged bonds with people who now feel like family. He's found he can have a meaningful impact on children and young people who are questioning their sexuality and identity:

"It's like they seek me out. They know I'm a safe space because I'm open about who I am and my journey. I think everyone knows I'll accept them as they are. I always try to make that clear."

Colin finds that both his colleagues and the young people have no problem accepting him or his sexuality.

"It doesn't really matter to them. Sometimes they joke with me in a playful way or ask questions but it's always out of curiosity and a desire to understand.

"A lot of the young people I've worked with are from different backgrounds and may not have spent much time around people who identify as gay. But I do feel like they really see me for me.

"Some of the younger staff connect with the kids more quickly due to their shorter age gap, but I still feel like I have a strong place in their lives—and it never stops them from connecting with me."



Education Updates

We always try to engage our pupils in fun, creative and practical ways to learn and apply their skills in real life across our schools, and we are excited to share some highlights from over the past few months with you.

Updates to our facilities

Our **Dunfermline Academy** has had a new Multi-Use Games Area (MUGA) installed and has been a huge hit with all of our pupils. They use it daily to practice their skills at dodgeball, football, basketball and handball.

At Muirkirk Academy, we have revamped a few areas of the school. It is now fully refurbished and a great space for our Humanities and PE coursework lessons. We also had a small revamp of the Therapy Room since our new Therapeutic Practitioner, Anna, joined us and the space is a fantastic resource for our pupils! Our English teacher, Olivia, has also completed her makeover of the Reading Nook in her classroom - this is now a cosy and inviting space for pupils to enjoy a book!

In the classroom

At **Dunfermline Academy**, our pupils have been growing plants in science while comparing the effects of different fertilisers, learning about the process of photosynthesis, animal food chains and other exciting topics, studying the relationship between living organisms and the environment. This has been done in partnership with Fife College who provided the exciting STEM boxes for all pupils.

At **Muirkirk**, our pupils have continued their valuable partnership with Police Scotland and the local policing team as part of our PSHE curriculum. We were delighted to welcome PC Daniel Dunlop to the school on several

Friday mornings, where he delivered engaging and informative workshops focused on the role of the police in keeping individuals and communities safe, with a particular emphasis on supporting young people. Throughout the sessions, PC Dunlop worked closely with our pupils to explore important topics such as the police's involvement in incidents of absconding, personal safety within the community, and the ways in which the police can offer support and protection.

These sessions have not only deepened pupils' understanding of law enforcement, but also encouraged open, respectful dialogue. Our pupils have responded extremely positively to PC Dunlop's visits, forming a strong and respectful relationship with him and his colleagues. We are thrilled that PC Dunlop will be continuing his work with us in the new academic year, with an exciting visit to the East Kilbride Police Station and training centre currently being planned. This ongoing collaboration is a fantastic example of real-world learning in action and has been a meaningful part of our pupils' personal development journey.

As part of our outdoor programme, our pupils participated in an array of various activities.

In May, our Muirkirk pupils enjoyed an actionpacked day at the Scottish Assault Course in Galston. The adventure began with several exhilarating rounds of Gel Wars, a fast-paced, team-based activity where pupils and staff faced off using cutting-edge gel blasters. Equipped with biodegradable gel balls, teams battled it out in a fun-filled, adrenaline-fuelled competition. Staff versus pupils brought out a fantastic spirit of friendly rivalry and lots of laughter! After a wellearned lunch break to recharge, it was time for the main event, the assault course. Pupils tackled a series of exciting and physically demanding challenges spread across the site, including high ropes, balance beams, monkey bars, wall climbs, and the undisputed favourite, the water obstacles! Teamwork was at the heart of the day as pupils supported one another through every splash, climb, and crawl. Our pupils showed great enthusiasm, resilience, and they all had an unforgettable experience!

Our **Muirkirk** pupils also attended an exciting STEM Garden Workshop at Dumfries House in May, where they learned with the team all about how science and gardening work together to support a healthier planet. They took part in tasks involving soil, planting and pond life. One pupil used these skills to help them complete their Level 3 Horticulture Personal and Vocational Skills course.

As part of their Level 3 Health & Wellbeing Personal & Vocational Skills Group award, our third-year pupils organised and ran the school sports day at Cumnock Juniors Football Club. It was a total success with lots of pupils and staff winning many races. We hope to make this an annual

event for our pupils to arrange and enjoy in future years.

Some of our **Muirkirk** pupils have also continued to attend Forest School sessions this term, providing them with core skills in a unique outdoor environment through child centred learning and long-term engagement, fostering a deeper connection with nature. These sessions have been led by our favourite in-house Forest Ranger, Kris Finlay.

Our **Dunfermline Academy** had a visit from DJ Jase Thirlwall to show pupils how to mix some tracks and learn about life as a DJ.

As an Eco School, pupils from **Dunfermline** visited Whitelee Wind Farm to find out more about green energy. They experimented with their own windmill models and were given a tour by the fabulous staff to get up close and had a chance to hug the wind turbines.

Our **Outdoor Education** trips to Lochore Meadows have restarted and the beautiful weather means our young people have been able to take full advantage of the kayaking and paddleboarding already as well as abseiling down a local quarry.
